We have the resources to what we want to do, but we must be mindful of our members' ability and interest to participate in our activities and meetings.

Everyone is encouraged to attend all parts of all meetings. To make the new meeting structure work, it will be helpful to be prompt at the part(s) of the meetings that you do attend – noting that other discussions or activities may be going on at the time.

This was proposed by members for members. Give the new meeting plan a try. Then you can help us determine if it is really a good idea and is achieving the original goals. Then, do you think it can be improved, tweaked, or should it be scrapped?

I realize that the timetable we set cuts right into Field Day, the summer hiatus, and the new term of officers. At the May Business meeting we decided that there is no perfect time, so if the idea is good now, let's start now.

There is another consideration that we discussed. What do we do with the club business that is covered at the present meetings but may be time limited in the new structure? During the weeks between meetings, issues will be mulled on a virtual meeting by email exchanges. If necessary, a summary will be prepared to bring before the business portion of the meeting for little discussion and possible decision. The "attendance" at this virtual meeting (email addresses) will be the officers, the Executive Committee, and those members who usually attend the current Business meetings. Since the practice has been for all members to be welcome at the Business meetings, any member who wishes to attend the virtual meeting need merely to state this to the President along with an email address.

BARC Meeting Structure Changes

After a good deal of discussion at the April Business meeting, we realized the impact of the economy on members and hams in general. We have had two meetings a month for many years and that schedule has served us well. Times are different now, and we believe it is in our interest to change. By holding one structured meeting each month (except July and August) and some other refinements, travel and other costs for members can be reduced. The club itself is in excellent financial condition, but our members must be considered.

Starting in May, there will be one meeting each month (except July and August), held at the Newton Police Department as we have done for more than the past year. Meetings will begin at 1930 with a 30 minute period limited to club business. This is followed by a 15 minute transition period with announcements of interest to the general membership. At 2015 the general portion of the meeting will begin with a speaker or other presentation of interest to all.

This schedule can work best with cooperative members and firm leadership. Business will be taken care of, the members will be informed, and the speaker will be treated with courtesy.

Still on the calendar will be a summer outing and our Holiday Party in December.

Starting in May, the Boston Amateur Radio Club business meeting will be consolidated with the General Meeting. Club business matters will be discussed starting at 7:30pm, going for thirty to forty-five minutes.

Can You Hear the BARC UHF Repeater?

Our 70 cm repeater on 447.175 MHz (-), CTCSS 110.9 Hz, has been reduced in power to accommodate the US Air Force claim of potential interference to the PavePaws radar on Cape Cod. This request, through the FCC and ARRL, applies to all 70 cm repeaters in this area. Since the government has primary use of this band, we must comply.

As expected, the coverage of this repeater has changed significantly, and we want to determine the new conditions. If you are able, try to make a contact on this repeater and note your result. Then please send an email report to w1bos@arrl.net with the following information:

CW frequencies include code practices, Qualifying Runs and CW bulletins.

RTTY = Teleprinter Bulletins = BAUDOT (45.45 Baud) and AMTOR-FEC (100 Baud). ASCII (110 Baud) is sent only as time allows.

Code practice texts are from *QST*, and the source of each practice is given at the beginning of each practice and at the beginning of alternate speeds.

On Tuesdays and Fridays at 2230 UTC, Keplerian Elements for active amateur satellites are sent on the regular teleprinter frequencies.

A DX bulletin replaces or is added to the regular bulletins between 0000 UTC Thursdays and 0000 UTC Fridays.

In a communications emergency, monitor W1AW for special bulletins as follows: Voice on the hour, Teleprinter at 15 minutes past the hour, and CW on the half-hour.

Daily Visitor Operating Hours:

1500 UTC to 1700 UTC

1800 UTC to 2045 UTC

FCC licensed amateurs may operate the station from 1400 UTC to 1600 UTC, and then from 1700 UTC to 1945 UTC, Monday through Friday. The station is closed 1700 to 1800 UTC. Be sure to bring your current FCC amateur license or a photocopy.

ARES Training Recommendations

-- The ARES E-Letter, March 20, 2008

All ARES operators and others who respond for emergency and public service events should periodically review their training and qualifications. Now is a good time to do so as we look ahead to the start of hurricane season just a few months away.

First and foremost, hams should take Level One of the ARRL Emergency Communications courses, progressing to Levels Two and Three when possible. Here are links to find out more about the ARRL Amateur Radio Emergency Communications Courses:

In addition to the ARRL Emergency Communications Courses, field operators should also complete certain formal training courses:

Except for the first two, all courses are free of charge, and CPR/First Aid may be free to members of the Red Cross. CPR/First Aid is the only course that requires periodic refreshers and the only course that must be taken in person rather than on the Internet. The American Heart Association (AHA) also offers Basic Life Support (BLS) courses. Where FEMA courses exist in more than one current version aimed at somewhat different audiences, any of the currently-available versions will suffice.

Committee reports –

Treasurer – Jim reported a balance of \$4575.52 in the checking account.

Public Service – Bob outlined six events on the schedule for 2008. There has been no word from WGBH for the fall. At present, more hams are still needed for the Olympic Women's Marathon Trials and for the Run of the Charles.

Other Business –

Jim, N1ICN, was appointed to chair the Nominating Committee.

Tom, KB1OKP, was appointed as Field Day Coordinator. He asked for help and guidance with the needs of the event. Bob has entered our Field Day site on the ARRL Field Day Locator web page.

Eric reviewed the time and topic assignments needed for the weekend Technician course at the Zola Center. Tom has detailed the topic allotments.

A table at Boxboro was declined.

Mark and others recommended we consider the transportation costs of members asked to attend two meetings each month. Discussion evolved to a new meeting structure of one meeting a month with business, announcements and program allotted suitable time. Business issues not covered in such a meeting structure will take place as a virtual meeting by routine exchange of emails.

BARC Volunteer Exam Sessions

The Boston Amateur Radio Club usually holds monthly VE sessions on the second Monday of each month. Sessions are usually held at 7:00 pm at the Pierce School, 50 School St in Brookline, Room 110, next to the cafeteria. A map is shown on page 7.

If the Brookline Public Schools (or the Pierce School itself) is closed due to inclement weather or other problems, the exam session for that month will be canceled.

There is a free parking garage at the circular driveway. If driving, enter School St from the Washington St side (opposite 394 Washington), rather than from Harvard St. Check: www.barc.org/barc/school_map.gif : for more info.

For those traveling via the **T**, take the "D" branch of the Green Line to the Brookline Village station. Walk north along Harvard St 0.2 miles to School St, then turn left. The Pierce School is on the left. The #66 bus runs on Harvard St, crossing School St.

Talk in on 145.230 MHz (-), PL 88.5 Hz.

We give all exams (Technician, General, and Extra). You don't need to pre-register. Please bring the following with you:

- Your current license *and a photocopy for the ARRL*, if you are upgrading
- Any CSCEs you are claiming, and a photocopy of them
- Valid ID (picture ID preferred)
- A pen and a calculator (if you want to)
- **\$14.00** (good for all the tests you take at that session, except for retests)
- Code and written tests can be taken together at the same session for the same \$14 fee.

The needed FCC forms will be provided.

Build Something!

Dan, KD6NU, has been writing for years on various ham radio subjects. Much of his material has been published in club newsletters, and he offers his articles at no cost. We plan to print some of these from time to time. – Ed.

A couple of years ago, a group of us were talking on the club repeater, and the talk got around to building stuff. One of the guys said, "You can't really build anything anymore." I almost fell out of my chair. That's simply not true. Heathkit may be just a fond memory, but there are still many companies out there selling kits that are not only fun to build, but are useful additions to the ham shack.

Here are several sources:

Elecraft (www.elecraft.com). In my mind, Elecraft has become the premiere ham radio kit company, if not the premiere ham radio company, period. The new K3, for example, outperforms just about anything on the market by many accounts. Personally, I have built the KX-1, which is a real blast to operate from a park bench or to take on vacation. I also have and use the W1 wattmeter.

TenTec (www.radio.tentec.com/kits). While perhaps known more for their ready-made rigs, they also sell a line of single-band transceivers and receiver kits.

QRP Kits (www.qrpkits.com). QRPKits.Com sells kits that were originally projects of the Northern California QRP Club. My current General Class students are going to build the DC40A kit (\$40) as an exercise in building and as a way to learn about how radios work.

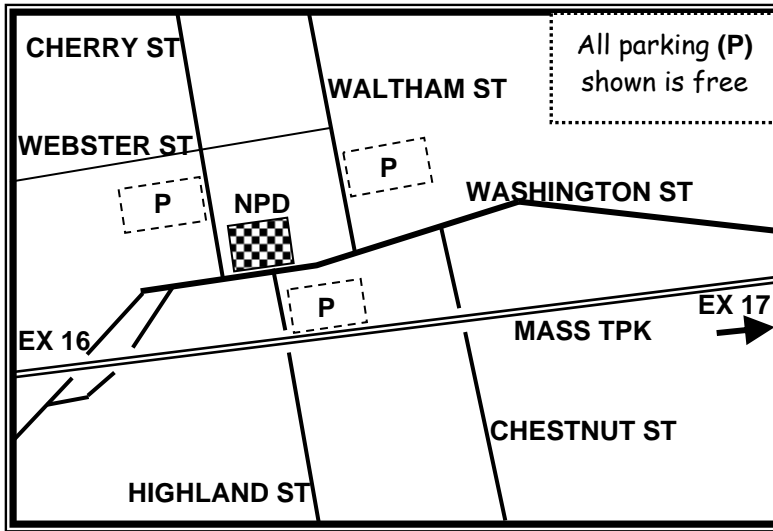

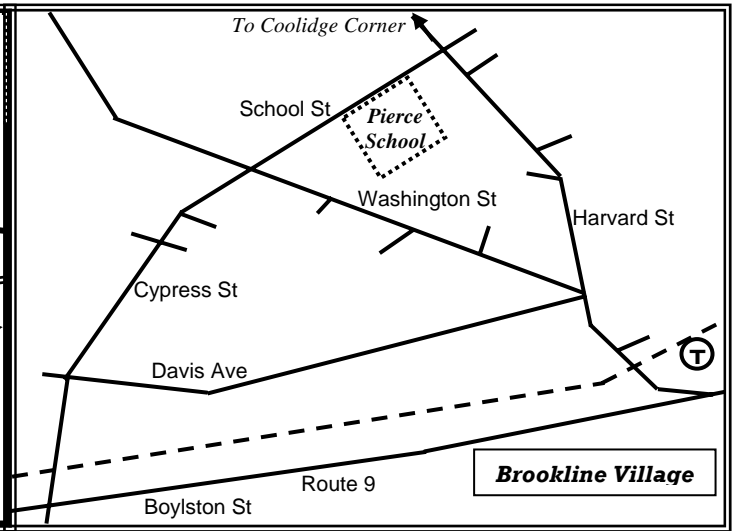

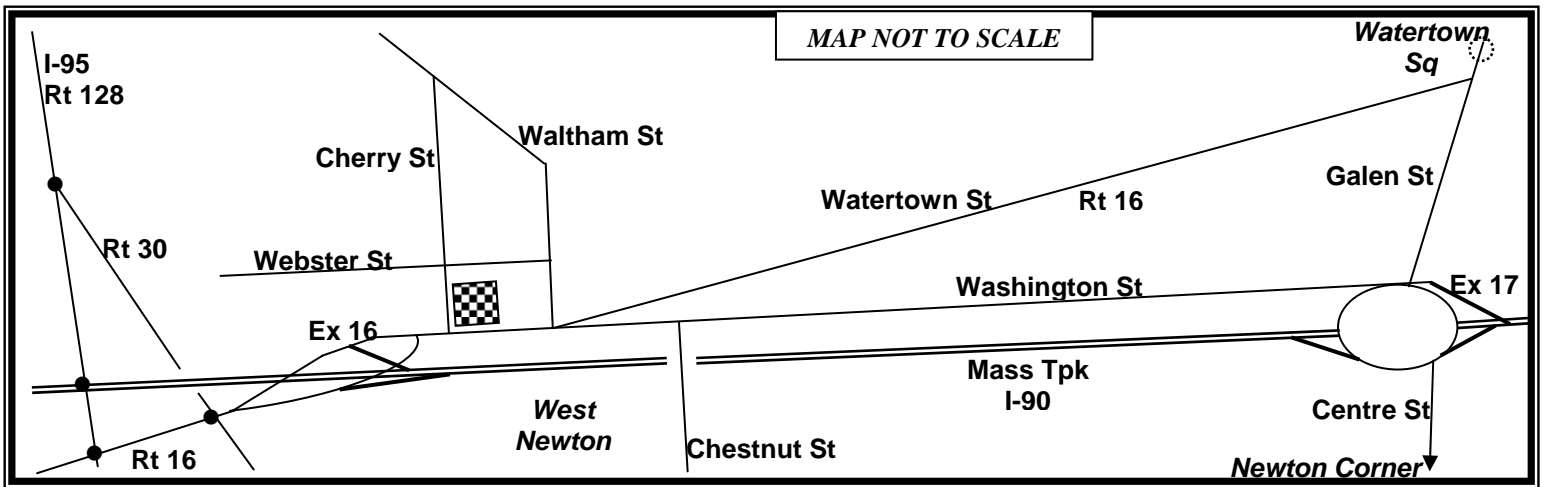
