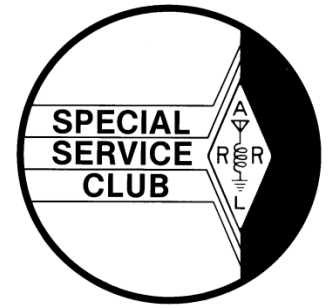

Message from the President – Joe Chapman, NV1W

At the December Business Meeting, Mark, KB1EKN, our Vice President and Chairman of the Repeater Committee, reported that the new VHF antenna was installed at the end of October and is performing magnificently. The mysterious interference problems we've had for much of the past year have disappeared, we're back to the great coverage the W1BOS machine used to be known for, and the repeater sounds as good as it ever did. On the UHF side the repeater continues to work well as it has since it was put back in service.

We're also in good shape as far as contingencies are concerned. We have a spare VHF repeater and UHF antenna, and once we repair the old VHF antenna that will also serve as a spare.

Even though the W1BOS repeater isn't used as heavily for casual conversations as it was in the past, it remains an important part of Boston's ham radio infrastructure. It's used for SKYWARN, the daily traffic net, and for supporting customer service events. It was there after the Marathon bombings, when the cell phone network became rapidly overloaded. It will be there during the next severe weather event as well.

At the Business Meeting Mark stressed that we will need to do periodic inspections of the repeaters and antennas. He also suggested that the club set aside money in a dedicated repeater fund. Unfortunately, repeater failures tend to require expensive fixes; shipping costs alone for the new VHF antenna came to \$150. The sense of those who were at the meeting was that the repeater fund is a good idea, and that club should set aside \$400 or \$500 a year with a goal of \$2000.

Because this year's repeater expenses have been unusually high, and also to get the repeater fund underway, I'd like to encourage everyone who can to add a donation to his or her membership renewal dues this winter. While any amount will be helpful and greatly appreciated, I especially want to encourage those who are able to write a check of \$100 or more to do so this year. Please feel free to contact me if you have questions about donating or the financial management of the club.

Finally, money is only part of the story. We owe a larger debt of thanks to Mark, KB1EKN, and Joe, N1QD, for all their work on the repeater this year. Thank you both from all of us.

Minutes of the December BARC Business Meeting- Geri Duff, KB1ISG (Acting Secretary)

Meeting called to order at 7:35 PM at the Brookline Police community Room.

On hand were: Joe Chapman NV1W, president, Mark Duff KB1EKN, vice president, Linda Blair NA1I, membership services, Brett Smith AB1RL, public service coordinator, Jim Clogher N1ICN, treasurer, Hank Buccigross K1QK, Bob Salow WA1DA, and Geri Duff KB1ISG.

President Chapman announced he is working on getting speakers for the coming year and that the board should start thinking about the 2015-2016 election of officers.

Vice President Duff gave a lengthy report on the condition of the repeater and its antenna. All is back to original coverage and there should be a yearly inspection to keep it that way. A spare VHF repeater is available if needed. The club should consider the move to go digital in the future.

Treasurer Clogher said that the checkbook balance is \$3,667.08

Membership services Blair mentioned that the VE schedule will be in the SPARC.

Public Service Coordinator Brett Smith said that the BAA wants Hams. He will be meeting next week of all the communication groups involved and will report back.

Bob Salow would like to see support for the treasurer increased by adding a person to the position. The Board will be reviewing the system to see if changes are needed.

The board discussed setting up an antenna fund dedicated to providing funds for replacement of the repeater antenna in the future. Money will be set aside in a separate account. Buccigross and Clogher will bring a plan back to the Board. After some discussion the Board decided to re-visit the idea at the March Business Meeting.

Buccigross led a discussion on social media, BARC List, Yahoo Group, and BARC website. Former President Bertolino sent information on GARA's website to Buccigross who in turn sent it on to Chapman. They will review and make suggestions to the Board on updating the BARC website.

Chapman said that not enough people signed up for the Holiday Party to qualify for a group rate and asked the Board to cover the difference in cost.

Voted: to cover the cost difference from group rate to individual rate for the annual Holiday Party being held December 7th at the Stockyard Restaurant.

Voted: To make a donation to a Ham-in-Need of \$50. Mark Duff will pass on fund to individual.

The meeting adjourned at 8:45 PM.

At that time we had just installed a Laird FG1443 to replace the Andrew DB224 that had been damaged the pervious winter. With this in mind, the club passed a motion to allocate funds to purchase a new DB224. The antenna was received in early October and installed on October 24. Initial reports have been **very** positive, but we have only heard from some of the frequent users. In addition, the UHF repeater has been on the air since spring, but has not been particularly active.

BARC Net Preamble

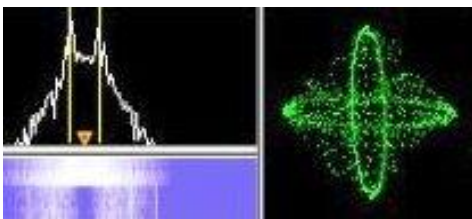

ARRL RTTY Roundup is Always a Mid-Contest Season Favorite -- The ARRL Letter, December 18, 2014



Dust off those keyboards! The ARRL RTTY Roundup <<http://www.arrl.org/rtty-roundup>> takes place January 3-4, 2015. It's very easy to get on RTTY and other digital modes, and some late-model transceivers even have RTTY and other digital capabilities built right into the radio. Participation in this annual operating event has grown along with the enthusiasm for digital modes. In addition to conventional Baudot, RTTY Roundup ops may use ASCII, AMTOR, PSK31, and Packet (attended). Newcomers are always welcome to join the fray.

The 2014 ARRL RTTY Roundup runs from 1800 UTC Saturday, January 3 through 2359 UTC Sunday, January 4. Participants may operate 24 of the 30 available hours. US and Canadian stations send a signal report and state/province, while DX stations send a signal report and consecutive serial number, starting with 001.

Submit Cabrillo logs via e-mail or by using the web applet. Send paper logs to ARRL RTTY Roundup, 225 Main St, Newington, CT 06111. All logs must be postmarked no later than 2359 UTC Tuesday, February 3, 2015.

Skywarn Recognition Day 2014 – Joe Harris, N1QD

BARC's 2014 Skywarn Recognition Day effort began on Friday, December 5. That morning, a small team assembled at the summit of Great Blue Hill to make preparations. The goal was to set up the HF antennas and run feed lines back to the Blue Hill Observatory building. Many hands made for light work, and the team had dipoles for 20 and 40 meters strung up by lunchtime.

The following morning the BARC group returned to the Observatory to set up radios and logging computers, as well as a VHF vertical antenna on a small tripod. The HF bands were slow going at first, but a surprising number of local contacts were being made on 2 meter simplex. Eventually, 20 lit up and the calls started pouring in. The group was active until early afternoon, and then they broke down to avoid incoming winter weather.

Ultimately, the crew made contacts with 18 other Skywarn Recognition Day sites, as well as 30+ states and three countries!

The following hams participated in Skywarn Recognition Day 2014: Mark KB1EKN, Joe W1JJF, Joe NV1W, Joe N1QD, Hank K1QK, and Bob WA1IDA. We were also visited by Joe W1HAI, Ralph N1LAH, Jeff KB1TJI, and Ed KA1RSY. Thanks to all who helped make the event a success, and thanks for all the QSOs!

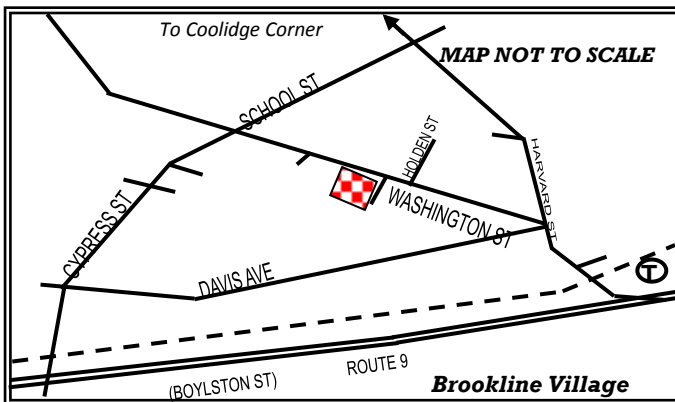
Quarterly Business Meetings -- Bob Salow, WA1IDA

- A pen and a calculator (if you want to)
- **\$15.00** (good for all the tests you take at that session, except for retests)

Note: Written tests can be taken sequentially at the same session for the same \$15 fee. The needed FCC forms will be provided.
